CASES

FAMILY LAW. Mental health; Local government.

Children; Deprivation of liberty; Detention; Right to liberty and security.

Hertfordshire CC v NK. [2020] EWHC 139 (Fam). Family Division (Fam Div). MacDonald J. January 23, 2020

A local authority's application for a deprivation of liberty order in respect of a 16-year-old boy was refused where his current regime did not subject him to continuous supervision and control. When considering whether given restrictions constituted a deprivation of a child's liberty, it was the current situation of the child which ordinarily fell for the court's consideration, not contingent circumstances.

Application refused

LANDLORD AND TENANT.

Assured shorthold tenancies; Dates; Notices; Possession claims; Rent arrears.

Pease v Carter. [2020] EWCA Civ 175. Court of Appeal (Civil Division) (CA (Civ Div)). Underhill LJ; Floyd LJ; Arnold LJ. February 17, 2020

A landlord's notice of possession proceedings under the Housing Act 1988 s.8 was valid, even though the date after which proceedings could begin contained a typographical error. Applying the test in Mannai Investment Co Ltd v Eagle Star Life Assurance Co Ltd [1997] A.C. 749, [1997] 5 WLUK 402, [1997] C.L.Y. 3256, the reasonable recipient would have understood the notice as giving the tenant at least two weeks' warning of the commencement of proceedings, thereby satisfying the statutory purpose of the provision.

Allotments; Appropriation; Disposition of property; Local authorities' powers and duties; Schools.

R. (on the application of Adamson) v Kirklees MBC. [2020] EWCA Civ 154. Court of Appeal (Civil Division) (CA (Civ Div)). Lewison LJ; Peter Jackson LJ; Asplin LJ. February 18, 2020

A local authority had not "appropriated" land for use as allotments and was therefore entitled to exercise its power under the Local Government Act 1972 s.122(1) to appropriate the land for use for educational purposes without seeking the consent of the secretary of state. In so deciding, the court considered the meaning of "appropriation" and the evidence required to establish that an appropriation had taken place

Appeal allowed





TORTS. Local government.

Gypsies; Injunctions; Travellers; Trespass; Unauthorised campers.

Bromley LBC v Persons Unknown. [2020] EWCA Civ 12. Court of Appeal (Civil Division) (CA (Civ Div)). Sir Ernest Ryder; Coulson LJ; Haddon-Cave LJ. January 21, 2020

The court gave guidance as to the approach to be taken by local authorities seeking to obtain borough-wide injunctions prohibiting encampment by persons unknown on public spaces.

Appeal dismissed

PM guarantees minimum funding levels for all schools. By Department for Education.

Every secondary school has been guaranteed at least £5,000 per pupil next year, and every primary school at least £3,750 per pupil, after new legislation was laid in Parliament on 30 January.

New law to provide greater security of occupation for people who rent a home in Wales unveiled. By Welsh Government. 10 February 2020

Under a new law to be unveiled on 10 February 2020 by the Welsh Government, people in Wales who rent their home will have a guaranteed minimum of 12 months' protection against eviction at the start of a new tenancy if they have not breached the terms of their contract. The Renting Homes (Amendment) (Wales) Bill is designed to provide greater security for people who rent their home, particularly those who live in the private rented sector.

The Local Government and Social Care Ombudsman reminds local authorities of their duties under the Care Act 2014 to administer "top-up fees" for people contributing towards relatives' care after two councils, Dudley MBC and Lincolnshire CC, disputed some of the Ombudsman's recommendations against them.

Parent to face prosecution for withdrawing child from LGBT lessons. *Sunday Times, 2 February 2020, 13.* By Sian Griffiths. Also Reported in Sunday Telegraph, 2 February 2020, 2

Jabbar Hussain has become the first parent to face prosecution after withdrawing his child from a school because it offers LGBT lessons and has stated that he is willing to go to prison. If found guilty of failing to ensure his son attends school regularly, he faces a fine of up to £1,000 and the imposition of a parenting order. Refusal to pay the fine could result in a prison term. He has instructed lawyers to launch a judicial review against Birmingham City Council's decision to introduce the lessons, which become compulsory in all English schools in September 2020.

Local authority websites let private firms access sensitive data. *Guardian, 4 February 2020, 22-23*. By Sarah Marsh.

Johnny Ryan, chief policy officer at the anonymous web browser Brave, has found that more than 400 local authorities share information with at least one third-party company about the individuals who visit their websites, including when they seek help with a benefit claim, or with a disability or alcoholism. Some councils also let companies track use of sensitive sections of their sites, such as searches for financial help or support for substance abuse. The companies assert that they have consent via the acceptance of cookies.
