B&M RETAIL PLC DONATES £20,000 TO OUR CHARITY

B&M Retail Plc have made a generous £20,000 donation to the charity following a successful grant application. Money donated will purchase two new, vital pieces of medical equipment, the Lucas Chest Compression System.

The LUCAS Chest Compression system standardises chest compressions by providing automated CPR on a patient suffering from cardiac arrest. Cardiac arrest remains a leading cause of death across the UK and can affect even the young and athletic. Devastatingly 95% of patients die before they reach the hospital. In these situations, the gift of time that our helicopters provide can make a huge impact and a lifesaving difference. In order to save the lives of cardiac arrest patients and avoid brain damage, a steady supply of oxygen to the heart and brain is vital so when advanced care is readily available results show the chance of survival increases by up to 30%.

Whilst the speed of our helicopters is vital in cardiac arrest situations, the small cabin of the aircraft can make the delivery of CPR challenging, even for our highly experienced crew. This sometimes means that a patient in cardiac arrest will travel by land to maintain regular CPR, losing vital time in the process. Having a LUCAS device on board will allow cardiac arrest patients to receive effective, sustained CPR throughout their treatment. This will free up our crew to enable them to carry out other treatments that may be vital in an emergency, whilst our helicopters take them to the right hospital for their treatment in the quickest possible time.

YOUR QUESTIONS ANSWERED: BEHIND THE SCENES AT NWAA.

How many missions do you do each day?

On average we attend over 2,000 missions a year; approximately 6 missions each day. Some days are busier than others as are different times of the year – the spring is particularly busy as many people get back to our active hobbies once the nice weather arrives. Boxing Day can also be busy with people enjoying their new toys.

How do you get called out to a mission? Is there a number we have to call?

Your local air ambulance is tasked by the North West Ambulance Service control desk. In any emergency, dial 999 and the call handler will take all the relevant details which determine if the North West Air Ambulance Charity is required (if the patient needs rapid response and/or is in a hard to reach location our crews will be called into action). We also transfer patients from local hospitals to the most appropriate hospital where they are in urgent need of rapid specialist treatment.

What is the process when the control centre receives 999 call?

A dispatcher sits in the 999 control room and reviews every call code coming in. They are trained to recognise trauma codes which include cardiac arrest and head injuries. It is these trauma incidents that the North West Air Ambulance Charity may potentially be called out to. The dispatcher will then dispatch one of our aircrafts accordingly if it is needed. All North West Air Ambulance Charity HEMS crew are required to work alongside dispatchers by working one to two shifts a month. This is part of their ongoing training as a HEMS paramedic.

What equipment do you carry that is different to a land ambulance?

Our three aircraft are equipped with everything that is found on board a land ambulance.





Does the North West Air Ambulance Charity fly at night?

We currently fly during daylight hours only. Visibility is dramatically reduced outside of daylight hours and the safety of our crew, patients and the public is naturally paramount.

How long does it take you to get to an incident?

North West Air Ambulance Charity has three aircraft located in Manchester and Blackpool to ensure rapid response to incidents across the North West. Most locations can be reached from between 5-20 minutes depending on location and the weather.

Who makes the decision as to which hospital you fly to?

This decision is made by all members of crew on board (pilots, doctor and paramedics). Doctors and paramedics will review the patient's injuries and assess if time or a specialist centre is more important, whereas pilots will examine weather conditions, distance and speed to ensure the swiftest journey.

What are the principle hospitals that your crew flies to?

We aim to fly patients to the most appropriate hospital to ensure the best possible treatment for their injuries. For example;

- Major trauma site Royal Preston Hospital
- Neuro sites Aintree University Hospital, Salford Royal Hospital, Royal Preston Hospital
- Cardiac centres Blackpool Victoria Hospital, Broadgreen Hospital, Cumberland Infirmary, Manchester Royal, University Hospital of South Manchester
- Burns centres University Hospital of South Manchester, Whiston Hospital
- Children's hospitals Alder Hey Children's Hospital, Royal Manchester Children's Hospital

Which hospitals have helicopter pads?

Royal Preston Hospital, Royal Blackburn Hospital, University of South Manchester Hospital, and Alder Hey Children's Hospital all have 'primary pads' – this means the landing pads are linked to the hospital and are only a 'trolley push' away. Those hospitals without landing pads have 'secondary landing sites' – this means the patient would require a land ambulance to transfer them to the hospital from the landing pad. These locations are pre-reconciled by our pilots and are in areas that are well known to the crews such as large fields where a land ambulance would be waiting prior to our landing to take the patient to hospital. For example; Aintree University Hospital uses Aintree Racecourse, Broadgreen Hospital uses Thomas Lane Playing Fields.

Why don't all hospitals have helipads?

Due to the location of many hospitals, land is limited which makes having a helipad at every hospital a challenge. It can cost a lot of money to build and maintain a helipad, particularly if it has to be located on top of a building. Our charity raises money to ensure our helicopters can operate across the North West and we can not fund helipads at each hospital. However, we are working closely with our hospital partners to support them where possible to ensure we can get our patients from scene to emergency departments as quickly as possible.

CASE LAW

EMPLOYMENT. Human rights; Local government.

Civil servants; Collective bargaining; Discrimination; Freedom of association; Parks; Police officers; Redundancy; Right to respect for private and family life; Trade unions.

Wandsworth LBC v Vining. [2017] EWCA Civ 1092. Court of Appeal (Civil Division) (CA (Civ Div)). Sir Terence Etherton MR; Beatson LJ; Underhill LJ. July 28, 2017

The dismissal of two local authority parks police officers by redundancy did not engage ECHR art.8 or art.14 when read in conjunction with art.8. Their claims for unfair dismissal were dismissed. However, their exclusion from the protections of the Trade Union and Labour Relations (Consolidation) Act 1992 s.188 to s.192 by s.280 of the Act construed in accordance with Redbridge LBC v Dhinsa [2014] EWCA Civ 178, [2014] I.C.R. 834, [2014] C.L.Y. 1135 was a breach of art.11 of the Convention. The court considered how s.280 could be construed in a non-infringing way.

Appeals allowed in part.

FAMILY LAW. Mental health; Administration of justice.

Admissions for treatment; Availability; Mental hospitals; Release from custody; Young persons.

LX (A Child), Re. [2017] EWHC 2084 (Fam). Family Division (Fam Div). Sir James Munby PFD. August 07, 2017

The President of the Family Division commented upon the lack of availability of mental health placements for children and young people in England and Wales. The fact that a bed had finally been found for a 17-year old girl the subject of care proceedings, whose need was overwhelming and desperately urgent, was not a matter for congratulation, but a further cause for concern. Securing the right clinical support for those who needed it could not be dependent on a senior judge publicly showcasing his outrage and frustration.

Judgment accordingly





HEALTH. Social welfare; Local government.

Care homes; Funding; Local authorities' powers and duties; Nursing care; Social care.

R. (on the application of Forge Care Homes Ltd) v Cardiff and Vale University Health Board. [2017] UKSC 56. Supreme Court (SC). Lady Hale DPSC; Lord Clarke JSC; Lord Wilson JSC; Lord Carnwath JSC; Lord Hodge JSC. August 02, 2017

Decisions taken by local health boards in Wales in respect of the provision of funding for registered nursing care in care homes had been based on a misinterpretation of the Health and Social Care Act 2001 s.49(2). The proper construction of "nursing care by a registered nurse" in s.49(2) was that there would be some circumstances in which care needed to be provided by a registered nurse, even though it was not care which only a registered nurse could provide.

Appeal allowed

HOUSING. Local government.

Comparators; Homelessness; Local authorities' powers and duties; Precedent; Priority needs; Vulnerable adults.

Hemley v Croydon LBC. 2017 WL 03129019. Court of Appeal (Civil Division) (CA (Civ Div)). Lewison LJ; McCombe LJ. July 25, 2017

The decision in Hotak v Southwark LBC [2015] UKSC 30, [2016] A.C. 811, [2015] C.L.Y. 1277 had substantially modified the previous test, derived from R. v Camden LBC Ex p. Pereira (1999) 31 H.L.R. 317, [1999] C.L.Y.

3062, for whether a person was vulnerable and therefore in priority need for housing within the Housing Act 1996 s.189(1)(c). Hotak established that a person might be vulnerable even if he could fend for himself, and the proper comparator was an ordinary person who had been made homeless not, per Pereira, an ordinary homeless person. Where a review officer had applied the Pereira test in considering an individual's vulnerability, the court could not be certain that he would have reached the same conclusion in any event had he applied the Hotak test, and quashing of his decision was upheld.

Appeal dismissed

Building regulations; Fitness for habitation; Residential accommodation.

Homes (Fitness for Human Habitation and Liability for Housing Standards) Bill 2017 (HC Bill 10).

A Bill to amend the Landlord and Tenant Act 1985 to require that residential rented accommodation is provided and maintained in a state of fitness for human habitation; to amend the Building Act 1984 to make provision about the liability for works on residential accommodation that do not comply with Building Regulations; and for connected purposes.

Childcare; Commencement; Ministers' powers and duties.

The Childcare Act 2016 (Commencement No. 2) Regulations 2017. SI 2017/785 (C.63)

These Regulations are made under the Childcare Act 2016. These Regulations bring into force, on 1 September 2017, those provisions of the Act which are not already in force. The provisions relate to the Secretary of State's duty to secure 30 hours of free childcare for working parents.

Amendment to FPR Practice Direction 12D: interviewing wards of court. Fam. Law 2017, 47(Aug), 884-885. By James Munby.

Presents the amended text of FPR PD 12D para.5, effective on 16 June 2017, clarifying that, following the judgment in Re Ward of Court (Fam Div), a child who is a ward of court may be interviewed by the police or other statutory agencies in relation to criminal investigations without first obtaining the court's permission.

CIVIL PROCEDURE. Mental health.

Case management; Court of Protection; Court rules; Practice Directions; Transparency.

Court of Protection Transparency Pilot: Case management S.49 pilots extension. Issued by Courts and Tribunals Judiciary. 27 July 2017

The Courts and Tribunals Judiciary announces that the Court of Protection transparency, case management and s.49 pilots will be extended until the date when the consolidated Rules will come into force to a avoid a gap. The intention is that a full revised and consolidated package of the Court of Protection Rules and their supporting Practice Directions, providing for the piloted procedures to become part of normal court procedure, will be laid before the end of 2017.

EU workers face discrimination. Times, 4 August 2017, 17. By Patrick Maguire.

According to a dossier compiled by EU citizens' rights campaign group The 3 million, EU jobseekers applying for work in the UK are being discriminated against amid uncertainty over their post-Brexit status. Displaying the extent of discrimination against EU citizens by dozens of employers, the dossier includes job adverts requiring applicants to be UK citizens or hold British passports, and rental properties advertised for British nationals only or subjecting EU citizens to different terms. Secretary of State for Exiting the European Union David Davis is being pressed to clarify the rights of EU workers.

NHS England warns of crisis in NHS and elderly care system. Times, 11 August 2017, 2. By Chris Smyth.

NHS England has warned that hospital trusts report that one in 13 people in England are on a NHS waiting list for surgery, but that due to five hospital trusts, including the UK's biggest, failing to reveal their waiting list figures, the true figure is likely to be "just over 4 million patients", the highest figure for a decade. Bed blocking has also risen from 173,122 in 2016 to 178,441 in 2017 due to a "crumbling elderly care system".

National Planning Policy Framework; Residential development; Tenancies.

National planning policy framework to change to stabilise rental market. Times, 3 August 2017, 2. By Sam Coates.

The Department for Communities and Local Government is to change the national planning policy framework to give an expectation that build-to-rent projects offer a three-year family-friendly tenancy, rather than the one-year tenancy currently offered. The British Property Federation has confirmed that 20 of the biggest investors and developers in the build-to-rent sector have already signed up to the pledge.

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
