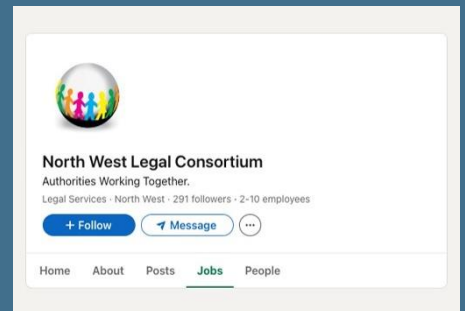

Top Tips for Commissions

To get the most from your commissions please follow these top tips:

- ✓ Unless urgent, give as much notice as possible.
- ✓ Be clear on what you are asking for – just a price or a more detailed proposal?
- ✓ Tell bidders the evaluation criteria – price, quality or both?
- ✓ Provide contact details and respond to any reasonable requests for clarification.
- ✓ Notify all bidders whether they have been successful.
- ✓ If possible, give feedback. This will help bidders to provide a more competitive quote next time.

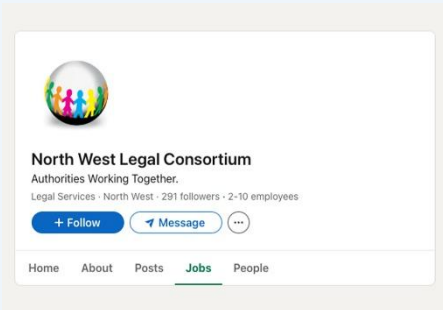

What is your current role and how long have you held this position?

Interim Director of Legal and Governance (Monitoring Officer) for the Cumbria Combined Authority (CCA) which was established by Statutory instrument on 23 February 2026 and officially created from the following day. I joined the Authority on 2 March 2026.

What does your role currently involve?

As Monitoring Officer, along with the Chief Executive (Head of Paid Service) and Director of Finance (S73 officer) form the CCA's golden triangle of statutory officers required to be appointed.

My role specifically involves providing senior leadership and statutory oversight for the legal, governance and democratic functions of the CCA, ensuring decision making is lawful supports high standards of governance, develops and maintains the CA's constitution as well as leading HR and Organisational development.

I am also the CA's designated Statutory Scrutiny Officer, Data Protection officer and Senior Information Risk officer.

What is one thing about you that would come as a surprise to most people?

Many years ago, I joined a salsa class – it turned out I was the only student who had signed up for the six week beginners' course and I knew more steps than the tutor. It was obvious that continuing to provide lessons with only one student was not viable from the business' perspective, but I managed to get three 1:1 classes before I had to join a larger group.

I was then encouraged to enter various exams (which wasn't part of my overall plan) but I persevered and went on to learn many dances (cha cha cha, rumba, samba, passa doble as well as waltz, foxtrot, quickstep, jive and tango) – not quite to 'Strictly' standard but have amassed many certificates and trophies – one of which looks very similar to the FA cup !

What are the biggest challenges facing you at present?

Making sure that everything that is required to enable the CA to be safe and legal and to operate efficiently and effectively, is in place.

What's at the top of your in-tray today?

As the CCA is newly formed everything is being developed to ensure that there is compliance with all statutory duties as well as basic infrastructure work – logo, letterheads, report templates, decision making protocols, recruitment, member training, committee management system, service level agreements and licences being agreed and signed off.

There are many items being worked on simultaneously so good time management and planning skills are a bonus.

Pending the election of the Mayor on 6 May 2027, the work of the CA will be overseen by a Board made up of two members from each of the Constituent Councils (Cumberland and Westmorland and Furness).

The first Board meeting was held on 18th March 2026, at which amongst other things, the CA's Constitution was approved. This is very much a working document and will be constantly under review. They also approved the setting up of an Independent Remuneration Panel as well as the recruitment of an Independent Chair for the Audit & Governance Committee and Independent persons under S28 of the Localism Act 2011 for standards.

All of these are within my remit.

How do you relax?

I enjoy watching football and in particular Manchester United and am looking forward to being able to watch them in Europe again next season.

I have also recently joined a Latin Improvers class, which meets every couple of weeks and has included doing translations from Ovid, Pliny and Virgil's Aeneid and most recently Caesar's crossing of the Rubicon. Not sure much improving is being done regarding remembering the vocabulary but I enjoy doing something completely different.
